On the first day, Mr. Bhattacharya introduced the fundamental skills of clay preparation and the importance of constructing a proper armature to support sculptural forms. The second day was dedicated to modeling a human face, where students applied their new found knowledge to create lifelike representations. The workshop concluded with a captivating demonstration of plaster mould casting, allowing students to see the entire process from start to finish. This workshop played a pivotal role in broadening the students' perception and sensitivity towards sculptural materials, igniting their creativity and technical skills. We are grateful to professor Bhattacharya for his invaluable guidance and for inspiring our students to explore the fascinating world of sculpture.

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
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

### INNOVATIVE TEACHING SCIENCE DEPARTMENT


Representation of an element Carbon by various atomic models viz Thomson's, Rutherford's & Bohr's model

### **ROLL THE DICE**












In a **Grade 9** class, students were tasked with summarizing their understanding of momentum and impulse using various creative techniques. The class was divided into groups, and each group selected a different medium through the "ROLL the DICE" activity sheet. The chosen mediums included role play, mind mapping, poster making, and comic strip creation. Through these diverse forms of communication, students expressed their ideas about key concepts such as momentum, its measurement, relevant formulas, and collisions.

Step-by-Step: Unmasking the Power of Loops

### LO: understand the purpose of Loop Why are loops required

In today's computer science class, I introduced the concept of loops through a fun and interactive activity. Students were paired up, with one partner blindfolded and the other acting as the "programmer." The goal was simple: guide the blindfolded partner across the room using single, precise instructions like "take one step forward" or "turn right."

As the activity progressed, students quickly realized how repetitive and inefficient it was to issue the same command repeatedly. This led to a natural discussion on the need for loops in programming—how a single loop could replace multiple repeated commands to achieve the same goal more efficiently.

The activity was not just a hands-on introduction to loops but also a powerful demonstration of how loops simplify tasks in programming. By the end, students had a clear understanding of how loops work and why they are essential in coding, all while enjoying the process of guiding their friends through a maze of commands.











### TRI-DOMINOES ACTIVITY TO INTRODUCE SOURCES OF FINANCE

A Tri-Dominoes activity was used to introduce students of **IBDP1 Business Management** to various sources of finance, incorporating differentiation strategies to accommodate diverse learning needs. The activity involved matching key finance terms, such as equity finance, debt finance, venture capital, and crowd funding, with their corresponding definitions.

To differentiate, the teacher, Mrs. Swati Chamaria, provided scaffolding for students with different learning abilities, allowing them to focus on grasping basic concepts before tackling more advanced connections.


The teacher also incorporated varied groups based on ability levels, enabling peer support. Visual learners benefited from colored dominoes, while verbal learners engaged in discussions to solidify their understanding. Additionally, tactile learners were supported through the physical manipulation of domino pieces.

The Tri-Dominoes activity provided an engaging, hands-on approach to learning, making the topic of finance more accessible. By the end of the session, students had a clearer understanding of how businesses use different sources of finance, and the differentiated instruction ensured that all learners were able to participate meaningfully.









## Macroeconomic Policy and Objectives Across Different Countries

The activity Macroeconomic Policy and Objectives Across Different Countries had **GRADE 10** students explore the alignment between macroeconomic policies and objectives across various nations, focusing on how countries address challenges like hyperinflation in Turkey or unemployment in Germany. The exercise aimed to contextualize macroeconomic objectives and policies within specific cultural, political, and economic environments, enhancing students' understanding of economic fundamentals such as growth, employment, inflation, and the balance of payments.

Team 5 presents their accurate analysis of the high inflation rate in the Turkish economy.




Team 4 proposed solutions to India's macroeconomic challenges using fiscal policies

Working in teams of three, students analyzed real-world scenarios, applying fiscal, monetary, and trade policy concepts to assess the effectiveness of different strategies. With one evening to prepare, they simulated real-world decision-making pressures, presenting their findings to Ms. Swati Chamria, the Business Head of Department, and Economics teachers Ms. Ranjana Chakraborty and Ms. Shampa Ghosh, who provided valuable feedback. Through the activity, students developed critical thinking skills, gained insights into global economic issues, and submitted exit reflection slips identifying areas for further discussion

### **ARCHIVE CASE FILES**











Archive Case Files is an interactive module designed to ensure that students of **Grade 9** gain hands-on experience in handling and interpreting historical artifacts. Ms. Preeti Roychoudhury spearheaded the workshop and their history teacher, Ms. Ayesha Banerjee, was present with the students during the workshop. This was carefully integrated with their study of World War 1, looking at the participation of Indian soldiers in the war. A curated collection of historical objects from the DAG collection relating to the theme was presented to the students such as photographs, letters, postcards, newspaper clippings etc. Stepping into historians' shoes, students were challenged to unearth details of the soldier's experiences of the War. The two workshops taught them how to document, interpret, and 'read' the archival materials to gather information and share their findings with their peers using a specially designed creative workbook.










### IGCSE, AS, and A Levels Results


