Grade 3






School Social Responsibility

A Fascinating Encounter with a Young Entomologist

Kitchen Garden Project 2025–26 begins.

At Calcutta International School, the Kitchen Garden is an annual sustainability initiative led by the Science Department, bringing together Grade 2 and Grade 5 students. The project helps students understand environmental care, waste reduction, and sustainable living through hands-on learning.



Grade 2 students sowed and nurtured a variety of vegetable seeds, observing plant growth and early development. Grade 5 students prepared nutrient-rich vermicompost using organic kitchen waste, learning about decomposition, soil health, and responsible waste management. On 3rd and 4th December, both grades collaborated as Grade 2 planted their saplings in the compost-enriched soil prepared by Grade 5. This meaningful collaboration strengthened scientific understanding while fostering teamwork, responsibility, and respect for nature, encouraging students to contribute to a greener future.



Counselling Workshops

Positive Parenting Workshop for Grade 3 parents

The School Counsellors, Mrs. Spriha Patronobis, Mrs. Farishta Dastur Mukherji, and Ms. Yashvi Thakkar, conducted an engaging and insightful Positive Parenting Workshop for the parents of Grade 3 on the 8th of December 2025. The aim of the session was to create an open, collaborative space where parents could voice their observations, concerns, and challenges related to their children's social and emotional development.

In this context, some of the concerns that parents shared were related to peer interaction, peer influence, influence of social media and other digital platforms, screen time and its impact on cognitive development and sleep, practising empathy in their daily lives, lack of structured routine and work habits at home, to name a few.

Another crucial area of discussion was the age of puberty, which is gradually decreasing - often children as young as age 8-9 begin their pubertal phase which leads to curiosity in their minds. This warrants age-appropriate conversations which parents can initiate at home so that our young learners are prepared and confident to face these transitions.

Many parents vocalised a sense of apprehension in addressing these topics and counsellors guided them on how to approach these topics, including referring to online resources. Emphasising the importance of responsibility and accountability, both parents and counsellors agreed that consistent consequences for actions, whether at home or in school, play a vital role in shaping responsible behaviour. One important suggestion was to begin with small but significant habits, such as encouraging children to take ownership of their homework instead of relying heavily on parental reminders or involvement.

The workshop concluded on a positive and collaborative note, with parents and counsellors committing to work together to support the holistic growth of every child. The session reinforced the importance of a strong home-school partnership and highlighted the shared goal of nurturing independent, empathetic, and responsible learner



Cambridge East India Community Meet 2025

Junior School Principal, Mrs Pratima Nayar and Junior Section Head, Mrs Neelam Choudhary, represented our school at the prestigious Cambridge East India Community Meet, which brought together school leaders and educators to celebrate a shared vision for progressive, inclusive, and excellence-driven education. Our school counsellor, Mrs. Spriha Patronobis, participated in a thought-provoking talk show at the same event. She shared valuable insights on how the Cambridge Insight Wellbeing Check has significantly strengthened the wellbeing framework and interventions at CIS.

During the session, Mrs. Patronobis highlighted several key benefits of the tool in promoting student wellbeing.

She shared that firstly, the Wellbeing Check provides a safe and accessible platform for students who may feel inhibited or hesitant to seek help, enabling them to express their thoughts and emotions freely.

Next, by relying on each student's self-perception of their wellbeing, the tool empowers learners to take ownership of their emotional health and development.

Also, the survey's division into distinct wellbeing domains offers a nuanced understanding of individual student needs, allowing schools to design focused, goal-oriented supportive interventions.

Finally, the immediately generated reports based on student responses make data interpretation swift and effective, enabling timely action and support.

The talk show was well received by participants, sparking meaningful discussions and inspiring schools to further strengthen their wellbeing initiatives using the Cambridge Insight Wellbeing Check.



Sharing Session on Active Learning and Assessment by Ms. Bose
